History and Purpose of the Alpena "Sculptured" Bi-Path

The Alpena "Sculptured" Bi-Path is a Bicentennial project of the Thunder Bay Arts Council, Inc. conceived to celebrate our nation's independence in 1976. Started in 1974 and developed over decades, the walkway/bikeway now works its way around the wildlife sanctuary at the heart of our city and its neighborhoods. The City of Alpena and its partners, including many service organizations, have managed, maintained and extended the Bi-Path several times since its inception. While the original plan called for sculptures placed along the path for public enjoyment, subsequent items of various categories have been added to what is an ever-growing collection of art, sculpture, artifacts and memorials. Connecting individual pieces as one collection for locals and visitors to appreciate and enjoy is something to be heralded for what it does to enhance a community's understanding of itself with a sense of place and pride.

We invite you to peruse the items along the Bi-Path as detailed within this booklet and challenge you to the Alpena "Sculptured" Bi-Path Scrabble. 

Description This sculpture of seven spheres represents the earth globe

comprised of seven seas and seven continents. It was inspired by the armillary sphere (1582) of Antonio Santucci at the library of El Escorial in Spain. Furthermore it represents global awareness and collaboration in educational endeavors, bridging the social sciences, humanities and arts with the technical trades across disciplines and programs of study at Alpena Community College. Faculty, students, and College staff conceptualized, designed, constructed and placed the sculpture on the Alpena Bi-Path. After gathering inspiration from social science and humanities faculty, technical design students and faculty in engineering collaborated with welding, concrete technology, and utility technology programs. The project encouraged

discovery and promotion of the value of an ACC education.



Description

Made entirely of used car parts from a Kaiser automobile, the statue was originally made for a gas station named Paul Bunyan's Gas and Eat in Gaylord which was owned by Bill Woelk, a WWII veteran who was born and grew up in Alpena. Built out of fenders and hoods with hair and beard made of steel shavings from a machine shop, the chest is a hood and the eyes are headlights. ACC is the statue's fourth location. When the gas station closed in the 1970s, the sculpture was moved to a museum until 1980 when it was almost scrapped.

Grayling Realtor Bernard Hamilton refurbished and painted the statue, using it as a symbol of the AuSable-Manistee Reality Company until 1998. Since arriving in Alpena, it has been used by ACC as the mascot for the Lumberjacks.

Description This plaque marks the site of where the first Besser Block

Machine was built in 1904. In 1882 Mr. Besser came to Montmorency County from Buffalo, New York with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Besser. The Bessers moved to Alpena in 1898 where Jesse completed his formal education and began his working career. In 1904 at the age of 22, Jesse Besser assumed the duties of design engineer, and with his father helped design and build their first concrete block machine. Mr. Besser was known for his great community spirit, leadership in business, religious and educational endeavors, and as a friend to everyone who knew him. The plaque is erected to honor Mr. Besser's 80th birthday anniversary

May 21, 1962.

Description Thousands of years ago the mysterious "Old Copper Culture

People" inhabited this area – one of the most significant of all "Old Copper Culture" sites. Tools, weapons and ornaments were fashioned from copper transported from numerous copper mines located in what is now Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The area highlighted by this marker was apparently continuously occupied by various pre-historic peoples until the arrival of the white man. Artifacts from this site and other sites along the river are on exhibit at the Besser Museum for Northeast

Michigan.


Description This relief sculpture of two Native Americans titled,

Indigenous Copper Workers, captures the industry and ingenuity of native peoples who first lived and worked these lands. Tools, weapons and ornaments were fashioned on this very site thousands of years ago and along the Thunder Bay River with copper transported from numerous copper mines throughout Michigan. Artifacts from the era and this very site are on exhibit at the Besser Museum for Northeast Michigan.

Description This diverse school of fish made of various metals represents

the importance of fishing, hunting and living off the land through the bounty of nature. Both ancient and modern people have used various natural resources to sustain life with nourishment and for enhancing ways of life with trade, recreation and sport. While farming and hunting are equally pivotal to the sustainability of populations and economy throughout the region over time, the importance of sustaining healthy eco-systems and a pristine Sanctuary of the Great Lakes is best represented by this school of fish (Trout, Bluegill, Perch and Crappie) from the fresh waters of the Thunder Bay River and

Lake Huron.

Description Timber, lumber, and paper production played a significant role

in Alpena's economic development from the mid to late 19th Century and into the present, morphing as required to meet market demands. The forests of Northeast Michigan helped build numerous communities, including Detroit and Chicago, and still provide lucrative raw material and recreational opportunities for locals and tourists alike. These 36 tiles in one mosaic represent the forestry, timber, lumber, and paper industries emerging from the forests of the region and how lumbering, water, transportation, and industry are integrally intertwined in an ever-evolving economy with firm foundation in the woods of Northeast Michigan. The White Pine, the Thunder Bay River, and Lake Huron are iconic images of interrelated economies of

past, present, and future.

Description

Limestone, cement, and concrete industries have been a mainstay for local economic and educational development since the evolution of the lumber industry in the early 1900s. As the timber resources exhausted, market demand for new technology and economic growth increased. Alpena and all of Northeast Michigan embraced industrial reforms and diversification by virtue of ingenuity and steadfast initiative. The region's presence on the Great Lakes would prove to be a vital component of global trade and transport, ensuring an effective shift towards the cement and concrete markets. Limestone would opportunely prove to be the true "salt of the earth" for future economic development in the region.

Besser Company's rich history in the concrete industry is humbly reflected in the limestone pillars at the center of the entire History of Industry Sculpture Series. The sculptural collection of Besser block machine gears and cams (circa 1929) is representative of the heart and mechanics of closely interrelated technologies and industries that have sustained this community's economy in its most modern manifestations, propelling the region to global relevance.

Lest we forget other economic contributions made by Jesse Besser, the Sculpture Series has been aptly placed on the very spot where the Besser-Churchill Company, a sawmill producing wooden shingles and barrel staves, once stood. A bronze plaque now reclaimed for this installation commemorates Jesse Besser and his contributions to the community and specifically the creation of the original Besser Block Machine.

Description The utility and aesthetic value of this pedestrian bridge reflects

the connection between Alpena Community College and Besser Museum for Northeast Michigan which are integrally tied in their educational and cultural missions. Constructed by the College as a gateway between institutions of education and learning, bridging the arts, humanities, history, social sciences, physical sciences and technology with nature and recreation, this bridge spans an historic County of Alpena drainage ditch and replaced an older railroad bridge at the back of Besser Museum and ACC properties. It facilitates parking and ready access for students and general pedestrian traffic across campuses. The bridge was painted red in 2016 to reflect a similar structure at Dow Gardens in Midland, Michigan. If you have not meandered across the bridge, take a walk and enjoy the connection between two beautiful and integrally related institutions of learning. Something so close can take you so far!

Description This is the first sculpture of the Alpena Sculptured Bikeway/

Walkway Project of 1974/1976 (known as the Alpena Bi-Path) in commemoration of the nation's Bicentennial celebration. Thunder Bay Arts Council, Inc. commissioned this sculpture with financial assistance from the Jesse Besser Fund, Michigan Council for the Arts, local individual and corporate donations. The sculpture's Fan and Horse Tail water jets reflect the heritage of the lakes and rivers surrounding Alpena. The strong vertical thrust echoes the tall trees of the surrounding timber-

lands.

Description

The mural is a reproduction of an original watercolor painting located inside the Besser Museum. Local artist, Judy Dawley spent hundreds of hours researching the common Devonian fossils found in and around Alpena. The painting depicts what the creatures of the shallow Devonian Period ocean of 350 million years ago may have looked like before they were the fossils we find today. As illustrated in the mural, Northeast Michigan in the Devonian Period was a nutrient feast. In the art, opportunistic feeders such as sponges, coral and bivalves use their tentacles to catch passing bits of food, while predators seek out prey. Giant boney plated fish strike at a school of primitive sharks. The sharks crunch the shells of ammonites. Ammonites capture trilobites that are grabbing sea worms. Spiny snails attach to sea lilies. Boring sponges and coral drill into mollusks. Brittle stars pry open bivalves. Each creature feeds, and in turn becomes food.



Description When a serviceman or woman is lost in the battlefield, it is cus-

tomary to arrange their boots, rifle and helmet. The surviving members of their squad gather around and memorialize their fallen comrades. Richard Rist recreated the same ceremonial arrangement for the Fallen Hero sculpture. He wanted to create a monument that made you stop and think for a minute about the real cost of war; a fitting and dignified tribute to our troops and a memorial that will keep their memory alive in a

permanent way.

Description On the evening of August 9th, 1865, laden with passengers and

full of cargo of iron, copper ore, ship knees, fish and leather, the Pewabic was hit by her sister ship, the Meteor. The Pewabic quickly sank about six miles off Thunder Bay Island near Alpena. In 1879, 1880, and 1892 unsuccessful attempts were made to locate the vessel. In 1897, salvagers first recovered some copper ore and artifacts. More ore was reclaimed in 1917. Members of the Busch Oceanographic Equipment Company relocated the Pewabic in 1973 and reclaimed more cargo from 180 feet of water. This bow anchor was recovered in July 1974 and brought to the Besser Museum in December 1974. The Admiralty-pattern anchor, the anchor shape most familiar to non-sailors, was placed on public display as a memento of the

lost vessel.

Description: This type of gun was used by the US Navy prior to and during

World War II as the principal weapon for vessels smaller than destroyers. It also was used by the US Army as an anti-tank weapon. During World War II, the Besser Company in Alpena produced parts for this gun. The breech mount is like those made by Besser Company employees. Loaned to the Besser Museum in 1978 by the Department of the Navy's Naval History and Heritage Command. Maximum range was 14,600 yards at 45 degrees elevation and ceiling was 29,800 feet (9,100 m) at 85 degrees elevation. Useful life expectancy was 4,300 effec-

tive full charges (EFC) per barrel.

and a community of support, this hand-hewn architectural contribution to the City of Alpena and the Alpena Bi-Path bridges space and people in a reflection of our natural surroundings as well as time, both past and present. You can visit Island Park by walking across this covered pedestrian bridge that straddles the Thunder Bay River and Wildlife Sanctuary at the center of downtown Alpena. Hear your footsteps echo on the solid wood floor as you walk over the lazy water of the Thunder Bay River slowly flowing underneath. One can ponder the present,

reflect on the past and dream about the future.

Description Island Park is a 17 acre city-owned island in the Thunder Bay

River Wildlife Sanctuary within the Alpena city limits. It is connected to Duck Park by a covered bridge. The Island Park World War II Monument was placed in 1946 by the Alpena Sportsmen's Club who owned the island at the time (It was known as Sportsmen's Island). The inscription on the monument reads "Lest We Forget - In humble gratitude this Island Park is dedicated as a memorial to the valiant veterans of World

War II - June 9, 1946"


Description This memorial stone honors with appreciation the life of O.B.

Eustis, strong promoter of Island Park visions and of viewing lookout. Because of his commitment to the island, the August 6, 1987 dedication ceremony was held at the viewing platform, with a panoramic view of the river, scattered islands, and wildlife. The bronze plaque reads: "With appreciation for the life of O.B. Eustis, 1913-1986. One of Nature's Noblemen. Steadfast champion of our woods and waters and all that live therein. H. Kuni of Detroit declared at the opening of the Alpena County Courthouse on October 21, 1935. Calling it "the first monolithic building erected in a cold climate," Kuni designed the Art Deco structure to be built of local Portland cement. Cement construction during the winter was believed impossible in Alpena; however cold-weather building projects answered the need for winter employment during the Great Depression. The Courthouse, financed by local bonds and the Works Progress Administration, demonstrated that winter construction with cement was possible. Description In 1861, Bishop Frederic Baraga (1797-1868) trod through

However, it was not until 1888 that Father Patrick Murray became the first resident pastor of the church dedicated to and named for St. Bernard. Father Murray was instrumental in the building of the first church structure, which was located almost directly opposite the current edifice. The foundation of this stone structure was laid in 1880. Three years later the church split into three parishes. The French parish, which kept the original structure became St. Anne; the Polish became St. Mary; and the Irish retained the St. Bernard name and records. This structure, completed by the Irish in 1884, houses the oldest Catholic parish between Bay City and

Cheboygan.

In 1904 when the City Council chose to construct the building of Bedford (Indiana) limestone rather than local limestone or concrete from Alpena's blossoming cement industry, many people objected. Bay City architects Clark and Munger designed City Hall in the Georgian Revival style. Since its completion in 1908, City Hall has been the center of civic activity in Alpena. A cupola crowned the structure until the 1950s. City Hall represents the work of several Alpena craftsmen. Local contractor Richard Collins supervised construction and the Northern Planing Mill and A.B. Crow did the

carpentry and marble work, respectively.

Description The Cannon displayed on the front lawn of City Hall is from

the battleship Maine which was destroyed by explosion in the harbor of Havana, Cuba on February 15, 1898. This event precipitated the Spanish-American war. The ship's remains were eventually raised in 1912 and at that time Republican George A. Loud of Michigan forwarded to the Navy Department a series of resolutions sent to him by the chamber of commerce and the common council of the City of Alpena requesting the loan "of a piece of naval ordinance of historical interest". In March of 1912 the Naval Department decided to loan Alpena

a six-inch gun taken off of the Maine.

The people of Alpena were ecstatic when the cannon arrived in Alpena on May 19, 1912. The common council planned a festive Independence Day for its unveiling and more than 7,000 visitors flocked to the City, eager to see the unveiling of the cannon from the martyred U.S.S. Maine. Alpena is one of few cities in the U.S. that can boast a cannon from the battleship Maine. This silent memorial to honor the loss of one of America's greatest warships still sits today in front of City Hall on the corner of Water Street and First Avenue. The cannon is

directed due north!

at the Alpena Yacht Club, Chub's adult playground.

In explanation are these words from the eulogy at Chub's funeral: "With drive, determination, ingenuity, smoke and mirrors, Chub White, Al Fletcher, and others coaxed two one hundred year old paper machines, the dual hearts of the company, to keep beating until the end of the twentieth century. Off the end of those machines and out into the world rolled paper for such things as navigational charts, hotel-placed Gideon bibles and Budweiser beer labels. The real reason for the miracle of Fletcher Paper Company was that its management appreciated those it managed. Chub White and Fletcher Paper forged their own version of 'Union', a mutual admiration society which often turned the chain of command sideways."







The bicycle is placed leaning against a pillar of limestone as if someone had been riding along the "Sculptured" Bi-Path and decided to stop and take a leisurely swim in the Thunder Bay River and the wildlife sanctuary at the heart of the City of

Alpena.


